Nevada Indian Commission Executive Director Report

BUDGET

Per Governor Sisolak's mandate due to global health crisis, NIC froze spending from mid-March through end of FY20. Vacated Admin III position for salary savings as a means to implement mandated 15% general fund reduction, plus 50% reduction of tourism transfers

FY2021

NIC budget = \$330,000 - all reductions = <\$8,858> *

*proportionally reduced deficit amount from travel line items

SISCC&M budget = \$305,000 - all reductions = <\$101,000> **

**grants / donations = \$87,500 <\$13,500>

Per Director of Nevada Tourism and Cultural Affairs, predicts future tourism reduction to include:

2021 = 42% 2022 = 30%

• 4 Nations requested early voting or election day polling stations for 2020: Duckwater, Duck Valley, Yerington, and Washoe, joining Moapa, Pyramid Lake, RSIC and WRPT. Deadline Sept. 1
